DRINKING FROM WELLS THAT WE DID NOT DIG



August 17, 2017 marked the 125th anniversary of a stiflingly hot meeting of 65 people in the basement of Second Christian Reformed Church of Paterson called for the purpose of forming Eastern Christian School.

In the 125 years since that meeting, the Lord has provided, protected, nurtured, and used that small school to prepare generations of young men and women for lives of service in the Kingdom. As we reach this important milestone, it is critical that we not forget the

source of each and every one of these blessings. For as Deuteronomy 6 reminds us, we have drunk from wells that we did not dig, and eaten the fruit from vineyards that we did not plant.

We have been the beneficiaries of the Lord's blessing in the form of the hard work and incredible generosity of the generations that have gone before us. Our predecessors were stubbornly audacious in their determination to build and develop our school into the institution that it is today.

They had no business starting a school. But they did it anyway! They were a group of immigrant industrial workers who wanted a distinctively Christian education for their children to help them become men and women of Christian character and vision who would transform the world around them in the service of God's Kingdom.

They had no business in building schools throughout Bergen and Passaic Counties. But they did it anyway! Building our first school in the midst of one of the nation's worst economic panics in 1893. Starting a second school in Paterson in 1899 and a building to house it in 1901. Building North 4th Street School in 1908, Midland Park Christian School in 1913, Passaic Christian School in 1916, and our first high school, Eastern Academy, in 1919.

They had no business in acquiring land and building three brand new campuses, our current three schools, in just 12 years in the 1950s and 1960s. But they did it anyway!

We have had the tremendous blessing of drinking from wells that we did not dig, eating the fruit from vineyards that we did not plant, and educating our kids in schools that we did not build.

We look forward with great anticipation to the Lord's continued blessing on our school as we continue to fulfill what I believe is the most important of all missions, the education of the children and young people who have been entrusted to our care. It is our turn to dig the wells, plant the vineyards, and build the programs and facilities that will prepare the next generations of Eastern Christian students for their lives of service to the Kingdom!

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

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On September 1, 2017 we officially kick-off Campaign 125, The Faithful Pursuit of Excellence.

One hundred and twenty five years ago, a group of Dutch immigrants opened a Christian school for their children. For the most part, these immigrants were not very well educated. We don't know exactly what their motives were but it is likely some simply wanted to preserve their Dutch heritage. Others were dissatisfied with the local public schools. Many desired a way to provide their children and the children of the Christian community with an education that would provide those children with a reformed worldview, although they likely didn't use that term.

One year later, they had the first school building on Amity Street in Paterson. Other Christian schools began to open in Passaic, Prospect Park, and Midland Park. Between 1954 and 1965 three new campuses were purchased and buildings constructed. These are our current campuses in Midland Park, Wyckoff, and North Haledon. Sacrifices were made, funds were raised and buildings were constructed. The generations that came before us laid a foundation and built a Christian school that all of us are benefiting from today. What an amazing heritage we have at Eastern Christian School.

Three years ago, we began to consider what Eastern Christian School's most significant capital needs were. The Board and Administration prayed that God would clearly reveal his will for EC's future. In late 2015, a feasibility

study focused on capital needs was conducted. Nearly 150 of our community members participated in one-onone interviews or online surveys.

Along with many other questions, our respondents were asked to rank the most significant capital needs that Eastern Christian School was facing. The responses were overwhelmingly focused in three areas: Security, Classroom Renovations, and Outdoor Athletic Facilities. With the

feasibility study in hand, EC's leadership now felt there was a clear mandate to move forward and plans were set in motion.

SECURITY:

Student safety and security have long been a priority at Eastern Christian School. In 2015 EC hired a Director of Security. Part of his responsibility was assessing the security needs on our campuses. This was accomplished through both self assessment and outside review by local and county law enforcement agencies. Based on these assessments, a plan for security upgrades was developed.

Campaign 125 will commit significant dollars to the completion of our current security upgrade plan. In addition to funds raised by Campaign 125, we have received

a \$75,000.00 grant from the NJ Office of Homeland Security and Prevention. Work on our planned security upgrades began in 2015 and Campaign 125 will allow us to complete our current upgrades over the summer of 2017.

CLASSROOMS:

There is nothing more critical to accomplishing our mission, than what takes place in the classroom. The means of engaging today's students have changed dramatically and Eastern Christian School needs classrooms that reflect these changes. For a number of years, major classroom renovations have been underway. In 2012 the pre-K wing of the elementary school was renovated. In 2013 the balance of the elementary school was completely renovated, including new windows, floor covering, painting, lighting and heating. The next year, in 2014, renovations began in the high school where a number of classrooms were upgraded and the hallways were painted. Last year, renovations began in the middle school.

Campaign 125 will complete our current cycle of classroom renovations. Forty-seven classrooms will receive renovations. Some of those will include complete renovations with painting, ceilings, lighting, and new furniture. Others, like the elementary school rooms that have already been renovated, will receive new furniture and technology upgrades. EVERY classroom, on all three campuses, will be air conditioned for September 2017.

ATHLETICS:

Exterior athletic facilities is an area where Eastern Christian School has "dropped the ball." While sports have grown in importance in our culture and in educational systems, our facilities are frozen in the 1960s. We have state championship track teams that practice their sprints and hurdles on asphalt driveways. We have lacrosse teams that have never had a home game. Our current soccer field is poorly drained leading to cancelled events. And the soccer field plays over the baseball infield creating a less than desirable, if not dangerous, condition for the players. And while community is very important to EC, we are unable to hold community events on our campus due to inadequate facilities.

Campaign 125 addresses each of these deficiencies. Our plans call for the construction of a regulation size, well drained combination soccer and lacrosse field. In addition, we will construct an 8 lane regulation track along with designated areas for other track and field events such as long jump, high jump, pole vault, discus, and javelin. The field will be handicap accessible and there will be spectator areas.

With enrollment rising (for the fourth consecutive year) and academic programs such as S.T.E.A.M., Project Acceleration, and Extended Learning growing; NOW is the time for Campaign 125. We challenge our students to pursue excellence and now is the time for us to provide them with the facilities, both in the classroom and on the athletic field to achieve excellence.

We have an incredible heritage at Eastern Christian School thanks to those who came before us. Now, it is our turn. With the help of our community and the Lord's continued blessing, we have an amazing future ahead of us.

ECHS WELCOMES NEW PRINCIPAL

David Intlekofer Shares His Story



He was young and supposed to be sleeping. Instead, he was hovering over the stairwell, spying on his parents.

His parents, had you asked them, were not doing anything

particularly spy-worthy. It was the 80s. For a Christian family, that meant it was not out-of-the ordinary to play Steve Green on the stereo. But in this home, on this particular night, the song took on a significance that his parents couldn't have guessed.

As *People Need the Lord* wafted through the downstairs, up the stairwell and into the ears of the little boy, the sneaky lad suddenly realized something: "I was the 'people' the song was talking about," shares **David Intlekofer**, new principal at ECHS.

He adds, "Although I considered myself a Christian from that moment onward, it wasn't really until high school that I realized the difference between Jesus being a part of my life versus Jesus being Lord of my life."

Along with his parents, David sees the role of teachers in his walk toward spiritual maturity. He can recall their names...names like Mr. D, Mr. Hansen, Mrs Nebbia...names that are unknown to many, but who represent people that "profoundly influenced" Dave's life, both academically and spiritually. They are also the people who helped solidify his own desire to work in Christian education.

And it doesn't take long to realize how much David values Christian education. He explains: "During the course of a typical school week, students will spend more waking hours with their teachers than they will spend with their parents. The influence that teachers have over their students is therefore incalculable, especially during the formative years up to the age of 18."

Driven by this passion, Christian education is a career pathway he's been on for quite some time, although it has taken different forms throughout the years. For the first ten years, he served as a Bible and language arts teacher at Annapolis Area Christian School. After receiving his Masters degree in Educational Leadership at Loyola University Maryland, he took on increasingly responsible roles, ranging from Dean to K-12 Director of Professional Development at Annapolis Area Christian Schools, and most recently, working as Principal of San Jose Christian School. In his latest endeavor, "I have found the most joy in creating programs that broaden or deepen the students' learning experience at school," he shares.

A self-described "learner" and an administrator passionate about collaboration, he says he's excited to jump into the community. "But what excites me most are the students—at all three campuses, the students I had the privilege to meet repeatedly impressed me. After visiting EC and going through the interview process, the overwhelming feeling I had was, "this is a community worth pouring my life into."

His service to Eastern Christian started July 1. EC welcomes him, along with his wife Kristen and son Joel. In lieu of a housewarming gift, he makes one request: "I'm a little nervous about learning 1000 new names, so please be patient with me! The best gift you can give me during this first year is a little reminder of who you are."

MATH MINDSET

A Look at Math Across Campuses

0, 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, 34...

This list of numbers, which stretches to infinity, is coined the Fibonacci Sequence. At first glance, it may seem like a random list. However, the pattern it represents shows up throughout nature—from the design of delicate flowers, to human faces, to powerful galaxies.

In addition to it being interesting trivia, the Fibonacci Sequence is one more reminder of the greatness of God. It is also one more reason to celebrate the faith-based integration of all subjects at Eastern Christian School, including math.

"I think learning math is learning about God. I love teaching that to students! To show them that God is a God of order and patterns, exactness and infinity, is to share with them God's characteristics," says **Carol Byma**, fourth grade teacher.

Eastern Christian takes its math programming seriously, always striving to raise the bar. At the high school and middle school campuses, the school continues to invest in additional courses to support all levels of learning. These courses include Geometry at the middle school, as well as Math Analysis, Statistics and Calculus 2 at the high school.

For students who need challenge, in lieu of AP courses, the high school offers a better alternative—collegeaccredited courses. "This allows us to teach the subject, rather than the test. Also, because of our block scheduling, students aren't restricted by the math class they take freshman year. They can double-up to reach higher levels of math," says **Eric Boonstra**, high school math teacher. He adds, "I [also] think our teachers at Eastern Christian are more invested in students as individuals. We go above and beyond to help students before and after school, and are constantly investigating ways to improve and diversify our curriculum."

Byma says that math "is and should remain" a strong area for EC, stressing that "numeracy is important across the board, pre-k through 12. With this goal in mind, for the past two years, the elementary school has transitioned into a new curriculum called enVision math.

"The benefit [of the new curriculum] is that the students are being taught the correct standards for their grade levels in a more updated and current manner," says Byma. "Consistent teaching of the same curriculum is beneficial as the curriculum targets the grade-level standards and spirals to review previously taught subjects."

The high school is in the process of switching out old textbooks with a similar mindset: "streamlining the curriculum by using books that align well with each other," says Boonstra. Cutting-edge technology resources are also employed throughout the grade levels.

Outside of the traditional classroom, students are further encouraged to use their God-given talents. Every year, younger grades participate in St. Jude's Math-A-Thon to benefit St Jude's Children's Research Hospital. All campuses also participate in math competitions, including the NNJCSA math contest and Continental Math League in younger grades, as well as the Trig*Star Math Competition, ASMA Competition, the AMC Competition, and Joseph W. Andrushkiw Mathematics Competition at the high school level.

Eastern Christian School has had some notable successes this year, even in international and national competitions. However, win or lose, math department chair and recent retiree **Deb Andrews** sees the importance of continually challenging the students in their math gifting: "At Eastern Christian School, we want to provide challenges for them to grow mathematically. As a school, we always strive for excellence."

CULTIVATING EMPATHY

Elementary School PBL

In His Image к-ч Self-Portraits



Visitors to the elementary school may notice hand-drawn hearts on the blacktop. At first glance, it looks like a fun way to pass the time at recess. But it's actually a creative solution to the essential question posed at the elementary schools this year: Since we are all created in God's image, how can we show empathy to our fellow students at ECES?

Every grade worked collaboratively to come up with a concrete way to show empathy. Second graders, for example, advertised chalk hearts. "A chalk heart is a heart that you draw around yourself to let others know that you are a friend who needs a friend. Second grade students bring chalk on the playground so that



students who are lonely can draw a chalk heart around themselves. Students then look for classmates standing inside a chalk heart and invite them to play," explains Sandy Bottge, principal of ECES.

Other grades also came up with creative solutions, ranging from classroom devotional aids, to prayer boxes, to participation in a St. Jude Children's Research hospital fundraiser.

The essential question for 2016-2017 is based upon the spiritual theme, In His Image, and is created in conjunction with the school-wide Problem-Based Learning unit done every year. "There are several benefits to PBLs. A typical PBL is student-based. We've traditionally explored our theme for the year through our PBL, which brings the theme into our thoughts and hearts," explains **Carol Byma**, fourth grade teacher and orchestrator of the PBL program.

She discusses some of the benefits: "Creating an action plan is essential for life skills, and collaborating with their peers helps guide the students into understanding how to work together, listen to other ideas, compromise and find common ground, respect each other's thoughts, and find solutions that will benefit the majority."

The chapel unveiling student projects occurred on May 9. As a visual representation of the concept of empathy, sneakers with student and teacher names lined the hallway to show that "everyone is worthy of us 'walking a mile in their shoes," says Byma.

What [has happened in the past] is that girls will go into high school knowing how to play soccer or basketball because of teams in middle school, but there wasn't anything like that for volleyball."

Despite a 2-8 record, there were a lot of close games, and Goldstein is proud of the exceptional progress they've made as a rookie team. He has plenty of confidence looking forward to next season, and encourages more girls to give the sport

a try. "I would say some students in the middle school are nervous about trying out for sports because sometimes there are people that don't make the team, but I definitely want to encourage everyone to try out. You grow from putting yourself out there and going for something. Even if you don't make it, you're no worse off than you were before."

Although many people are familiar with Eastern Christian's mission—engaging the mind, nurturing the spirit, transforming the world—less are aware that the school also has a graduate profile.

Here's an excerpt: "The Eastern Christian graduate is prepared to be a person of Christian vision and influence and seeks to contribute cooperatively and responsibly to God's mission of renewing all creation."

This profile is something the high school teachers emphasize throughout the year, and it is always a joy to celebrate with—as well as commission—the young men and women as they leave the halls of EC.

This year's graduation took place on June 14 in the high school gym, where 77 students graduated as the Class of 2017. The class represented a wide variety of talent, ranging from the academic success of Valedictorian **Kyle Streelman** to the Christ-like service of students like **Scott Steenstra**, who was awarded with the 2017 Faculty Award. The class verses aptly put the grade in perspective: "For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others" (Romans 12:4-5). Steenstra, speaking to his peers during commencement on account of Streelman's unexpected illness that week, also reminded the class "the challenge for each and every one of us is to use our gifts to transform the world for the Glory of God."

Similarly, commencement speaker and faculty member **Suzanne Kraai** focused on the unique and individual giftedness of each person and exhorted the graduates to submit those gifts under the Lordship of Christ.











Sharing from her life, she said, "Most importantly, I had no idea how powerful experiences with the Lord would continue to shape my life's work and how as I drew closer to Him and learned to use my gifts in the ways HE defined, it would be the most gratifying experience of deep-seeded joy."

Circling back to concepts in the graduate profile, Kraai ended with a final thought: "EC, in partnership with your parents, families, friends and loved ones, those present today and those who have gone before you to meet the Lord, have tirelessly prayed and worked to support you to hear your calling, to root your foundation in becoming a leader with purpose. Now it is your turn to decide—is your identity about you, or is it defined by Christ's gift through the passion you show?"



Knowing the King's Song


The middle school gym was packed with smiling faces as 63 eighth graders walked down the aisle in anticipation of a new chapter: high school.

Principal **Dan Lazor** delivered the commencement address, centering his speech on a foundational doctrine of faith, as well as the school's theme for the year: Made in His image.

Genesis 1:27 records, "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created them." Lazor brought this message to life by incorporating two familiar books: Eric Carle's *The Mixed Up Chameleon*, and Max Lucado's *The Song of the King*. In the first, he demonstrated the confusion that can arise when we fail to realize our own uniqueness. The latter book stressed the importance of knowing "the king's song" despite false songs that play at the same time.



"Regardless of how long you have attended the middle school, there is one, constant theme that has been repeated to you by our staff--one song that has been played over and over again. It is a truth that comes directly from the pages of Scripture—that you are God's image bearers and possess immeasurable worth, regardless of the messages that may come to you from the world," shared Lazor.

He ended with a challenge based on an iconic scene in the movie, Dead Poet's Society. "Your teachers have not been whispering 'Carpe Diem,' as Mr. Keating did. No, they have been whispering another Latin phrase – 'Image Dei', 'Image of God,' 'Image Bearer.' Even more than the challenge to seize the day is the challenge to hear this foundational truth-that you are made in the image of God."



"My encouragement to you is to see that image in yourself. But it is equally important that you see that image of God in others. It is the basis for philanthropy and benevolence; the reason one might sacrifice time, or energy, or resources for the sake of another—they are fellow image bearers—and in being so, they possess worth and value beyond measure," Lazor ended.

The platform was also shared by a variety of eighth grade students. Salutatorians **Kelly Steenstra** and **Michael Steiginga** both delivered moving prayers, one to open the ceremony, and the other after the commencement address.

Valedictorian **Aidan Sehulster** also spoke on the school theme, as well as reflecting on the leadership and maturity of those in his class. He added, "This grade has been a blessing to all of us. All these graduates have been given the opportunity to be leaders in this school, to learn under our teachers, and to grow in our faith."

REMEMBERING

The Foundation Office has learned of the following deaths of these alumni and former faculty members since our last issue of **The Herald**.

Former Faculty & Board

Dr. Charles Adams, age 70 of Sioux Center, Iowa went home to be with the Lord on 2/24/17. He graduated from Newark College of Engineering, and received two Masters Degrees, one from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute of Engineering and one from Montclair State in teaching. He began his engineering career working for Pratt & Whitney Aircraft. According to an online tribute,

"Charley was an engineer, a scientist, a technician, who quit the lab because he felt a call to teach, not just anywhere either, but at a place where faith took in every class, a place where teachers didn't just sit comfortably on their faith fannies but worked hard to try to know what God wanted of them in every last area of life."

Eastern Christian High School was blessed to have him as a science, physics and chemistry teacher from 1971-1979. He left EC to start an engineering program at Dordt College, and years later, his contribution was acknowledged by naming the new engineering wing "The Charles Adams Engineering Center."

"Mr. Adams" as he was known then, is fondly remembered by his former students and colleagues.

SUPPORTING HEAVY HANDS

In Exodus 17, in an account detailing the battle of the Amalekites and Israelites, the Bible records that Moses' hands got heavy. Knowing the Israelites only won when his hands were held high, Aaron and Hur came alongside their leader to raise his tired arms.



This biblical story serves as a good visual picture for the purpose of East Mountain, which essentially endeavors to do the same: support churches and local ministries by training and spiritually developing its leaders in an area of increasing spiritual darkness—Europe.

"East Mountain hopes to be a place where leaders, both in the local area and from across Europe, can encounter Christ in deep and life-changing ways, be trained and resourced for their work, and receive mentoring, theological training and spiritual care," shares Carrie Johnson.

Carrie, together with her husband Michael and their family, will soon travel from New Jersey to serve as missionaries with East Mountain in Edinburgh, Scotland. It is a

dramatic shift from their most recent vocation, working on staff at Living Word Church in North Haledon, where Michael was senior pastor and Carrie the director of spiritual formation. Yet the family sees the move as a direct calling.

The seeds for the move were sown in Carrie's heart starting in 2012, when she took a spiritual formation class at Alliance Theological Seminary. "This class tipped me into a life-changing spiritual awakening," she shares. "This is how Jesus did ministry-investing deeply in the lives of twelve and then sending them out to do the same for others. Since we have experienced firsthand the power of spiritual formation to change our own hearts, we are so eager to invite other people in ministry who are living out of spiritual dryness into a fresh encounter with Jesus."

Members of Carrie's family have been in the EC community for four generations and Carrie credits the school with having a "profound impact in the spiritual development of my family." For her personally, she believes EC played a crucial role in shaping who she became. In particular, "I remember Mr. Beverly challenging me to find my voice. I was so shy in high school and afraid to share my opinion. But he wouldn't let me hide in the shadows and I'm grateful that he saw beneath the surface," she shares.

TRAINED IN THE WAY

L. Joan Rypkema '49

Many years ago, Joan Rypkema secured a sticker to the back of a journal. It read: "Will it matter that I have been?" As she looks back over the unexpected journey of her life, she is grateful, she says, that "in many ways, the answer [is] yes."

Despite all the ups and downs that mark her career and life, one guiding principle, she says, has held firm. The lesson is from Proverbs 22:6: "Train children in the right way, and when old, they will not stray."

True to this principle, her connection to Christian education began early. In 1938, Joan attended Pine Street Christian School in Passaic for the first eight years of her formal education. She remembers having a comfortable childhood, despite financial hardship that resulted in her transferring to Lodi High School. Yet this was not the only major change in her young life. Shortly thereafter, her father suddenly passed away. Her mother, recognizing the terrible impact on her family, asked Joan what she wanted. Joan was resolute: She wanted to go to Eastern Academy. And by the grace of God, she went. "That private education was a gift from God at a time when it was sorely needed," says Joan.

Joan graduated from Eastern Academy at 16 years old in 1949. She would go on to earn an undergraduate liberal arts degree from Seton Hall, and then a Master's at Purdue. Eventually, she became a writing teacher at the university. That chapter of her life all changed in 1969, however, when she helped a friend move to Berkeley Springs, West Virginia.

Joan wasn't fond of the state initially, but was drawn to a teaching opportunity she found, working as an English teacher at North Junior High School in Martinsburg, West Virginia. Soon, she accepted a different position as language arts teacher of Berkeley Springs High School. **CONTRARY TO THE** WORLD'S GOALS, JOAN VALUES STRONG FAITH, A SENSE OF CALLING, COMMITMENT AND INTEGRITY. Joan encouraged her students to think for themselves beyond the confines of a classroom. Prompted by seeing sexually graphic graffiti on the walls and desks of the school, she talked to students using correct terms. She wanted her students to understand the power of words and to never abuse or misuse them.

As a result, her journey in Berkeley Springs wasn't an easy one—it involved a four-year legal battle with the school board regarding unfair dismissal that was eventually retracted. Joan is proud of her call to teach and thankful she had the strength to fulfill that calling for more than 20 years. Contrary to the world's goals, Joan values strong faith, a sense of calling, commitment and integrity.

Her reward is not measured in dollar figures, but in the lives she was able to touch. Many of her former students are parents and grandparents today, and many of them stay in touch. She is gratified when she hears them say, "Ms. Ryp was the best."

Alongside the cherished words from Proverbs 22:6, one other principle is dear to her heart. She carries a card in her wallet with words from Psalm 59:9: "God is my defense." She shares, "I think of these two guiding principles as bookends of my life. They have carefully and with firmness held me throughout my life and indeed, God is and has been my life from the very beginning."

50+ YEARS AT HARVARD



In 1953, Joseph Brain was one of many freshmen starting off at Eastern Academy. Short, skinny—and by his own admission, a little nerdy—people likely wouldn't have predicted what he would grow up to be.

Yet despite his unassuming, adolescent characteristics, one teacher—Mr. Sidney Bangma saw something more. Perhaps without even realizing it, the extra investment would set the direction for this young man's entire life.

"Every high school student should have the opportunity to be mentored by someone like Sidney Bangma. He awakened in me a passion for scientific discovery and teaching—his vision still guides me after 60 years," states Brain. "Sidney Bangma was a great teacher in the classroom, and he taught me physics and chemistry.

But more than that, Sidney Bangma was a friend for me and other students...I will forever be grateful to him for his interest in me and his catalytic role in starting me on a scientific career."

After Eastern Academy, Brain went on to Taylor University, where he met his wife. The two would move on to Harvard-she to Harvard Divinity School and he to pursue two master's degrees and one doctoral degree with a specialty in environmental health. He would later serve more than 50 years at Harvard, currently working as the Cecil K. and Philip Drinker Professor of Environmental Physiology at Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He also chaired the Department of Environmental Health at Harvard for 15 years.

"My subspecialty is lung biology and inhalation toxicology. I am particularly interested in the air we breathe and in pollutants caused by fossil fuel combustion or occupational exposures. I am also interested in drug delivery to and through the lungs," he shares. "Guiding my work has been the conviction that it is far better to prevent disease than it is to diagnose and treat it."

Although his bio includes more than 200 published papers on respiratory defense mechanisms in the lungs, as well as the effect of pollution on public health, he says his "most enduring contributions

are probably former students where, like Mr. B did for me, I might have pointed them in the right direction."

Brain remembers other high school teachers who played a role in shaping his worldview, including Sidney Van Til and Frances Greydanus. He also recalls talented fellow students who enriched his experience. As he reflects back on the role of the school, he shares, "without a doubt, those four years in the ECHS system launched my entire life and established persistent attitudes and opportunities."

Today, "as I read the frequent communications from EC, I am profoundly grateful for how it has changed while maintaining Christian values. The intentional policy to increase ethnic diversity broadens the school's educational and cultural environment. My faith emphasizes less what we believe and focuses more on how we behave so I am heartened by the passion of ECHS students to make the world a better place."

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
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
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
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
