


September teachers from three campuses began meeting to address a new initiative for the 2005 - 2006 school year. Calling the initiative Cross Campus Collaboration on Communication, administrators and teachers are exploring how Eastern Christian School can be unified in the teaching of communication skills from campus to campus. Six elementary and middle school teachers representing the Grades 4 to 5 transition, and six middle and high school teachers representing the Grades 8 to 9 transition will meet once a month for two hours of collaborative work.

Eastern Christian recognizes that a major purpose of Christian education in relation to the great issues of


justice and peace should be in its continual nourishing and sustaining of young people who will act responsibly as believers in their duties as citizens of the world and of God's kingdom. In achieving that purpose, we believe Eastern Christian graduates need to be competent and confident communicators of the true story of the Gospel in this crucial time of history. As citizens of two kingdoms, our graduates must be able to articulate through written and spoken words "the reason for the hope" (I Peter 3:15) they have in God's redemptive design for people and a world suffering from the ripple effects of sin. More than ever before we live

in a time when people have lost hope, have mortgaged the future for the present, and have lost any moral sense of truth. Beginning with the nation of Israel in the Old Testament and continuing with an ever-increasing community of chosen covenant believers after Christ's death and resurrection, God clearly has chosen to reveal His glory and His plan for redemption through a community of believers. *Eastern Christian School purposes to nurture and educate covenant children who will act responsibly as important ambassadors of the truth.* Therefore, primarily, a distinguishing mark of each EC grad should be an ability to competently and confidently communicate the compelling hope we have in God's completion of the true story. Secondarily, but also important, each EC grad should demonstrate high proficiency in writing and public speaking skills across all disciplines.

Each monthly, ECHS teachers Paul Beverly, Marla Stout and Phil Verrengia are meeting with ECMS teachers Joyce Breur, Pamela Kosten, and Betsy Tyvoll. Concurrently, ECMS teachers JoAnn Everett, Everett Henderson, and Pamela Kosten are meeting with ECES teachers Carol Byma, Alisa Engelhard, and Virginia Folk. These teachers have been selected by their building principals to pilot this initiative to carry collaboration beyond the walls of each campus. Periodically, the campus teams will solicit input, communicate their progress, and report on their conclusions at their individual campuses. As a result of their efforts, we hope to achieve a specific unified vision and strategy for how we as a school will graduate competent and confident communicators who serve the Lord in word and deed.

EC Responds to Community Needs

Introduction: Prepared to Serve

 ${f A}$ ccording to a report to the EC Board of Directors from our Fundraising Strategies Committee, three attributes that make Eastern Christian School distinctively different include the following:

EC offers excellence in education from a distinctly Christian world and life view.

EC is a diverse community of believers that values all students as God's image-bearers.

EC prepares students for lives of service to their communities.

This fall our school's parents, students, and staff were presented with an important opportunity to show that these were not simply written statements to serve as goals, but that they were motivation for action when the need arose to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina. In a letter to parents in early October, the Special Projects Committee of EC Elementary School stated: "Because we care about the families living in the path of this hurricane…we would like to inspire our students to give out of their abundance to those in need."

What follows on the pages of this issue is a summary of ways in which each of our EC schools, from the Elementary School to the High School, took on different projects to help people in need of assistance in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. Please pray with us for all of those involved in relief efforts, asking God to give comfort to those who are working to rebuild their lives and to enable resources to reach wherever they are needed in the southern United States.

Hurricane Katrina Brings Two Students to EC

On September 14 our school community welcomed two students whose family temporarily relocated to New

Jersey after Hurricane Katrina struck the Gulf Coast. **Samantha Halleran** joined our 7th grade, and **Joshua Newman** entered our 4th grade class. They, along with their brother, Seth (age 2), are the children of David and Tina Newman, from Long Beach, Mississippi, just south of Gulfport. Tina and the children stayed with friends in North Haledon for a short time while husband David worked at reorganizing their life in Mississippi.

Our visiting family returned to Mississippi on Friday, Oct. 7. A member of their host family stated, "They really enjoyed their experience in NJ. They have all had hard lives, kids and Mum, and I could see them relaxing. Both [students] enjoyed their school experience and had made friends...I cannot talk too highly about the response that we received from the community and Eastern Christian. It really does reinforce your faith in human kind and the Lord's ability to touch hearts."

We have been in contact with *Christian Schools International* (CSI), who has indicated the potential need for places for children from Grace Christian in Pascagoula and from three Lutheran schools in the New Orleans area. We understand we are one of many CSI schools that have offered to help, and we stand ready to minister to additional students if the need arises.

After successfully raising \$10,000 for the victims of the tsunami earlier this spring - \$8000 in gifts plus \$2000 in challenge gifts - student leaders decided to set a goal of another \$10,000 for victims of the recent gulf coast flooding. A joint committee of the National Honor Society and newly formed Student Senate met to set the target and lay out the fundraising strategy. Erin Balkema, Matt Bouwense, Lisa Genzink and Deidra Ramos-Perez comprised the Relief Committee.

Teacher **Barry Veenstra** agreed to shave his moustache, which has been in his family for 14 years!



Teacher **Paul Beverly** agreed to sport a bunny costume for a school day, courtesy of Abma Farms.




Highlights of the project included:

ECMS Students Say "We've Got Your Back" (Service

Twenty-three compassionate and energetic eighth grade students volunteered to lead a school-wide student initiative and spearheaded the We've Got Your Back initiative during the month of September. This idea was discovered on the Internet at www.dosomething.org, a nation-wide not-for-profit organization whose mission is to give young people inspiration and an opportunity to make a difference. Students were encouraged to either purchase a new backpack or bring gently used backpacks from home and fill them with new school supplies such as erasers, notebooks, binders, paper, pens, pencils, etc. A letter from our students to the student recipient was also enclosed in each backpack. A total of 295 backpacks were donated to students affected by Hurricane Katrina! Mrs.

Everett's homeroom collected the most – 41 backpacks!

After stopping at McDonald's for lunch, the students in this homeroom went by bus on Wednesday, September 21, to deliver the 295 backpacks to a drop-off point in Westwood, New Jersey. From there Bassett Furniture Company delivered the backpacks to a middle school in Texas to be distributed to students affected by Hurricane Katrina.

Little did we know when we started this project that two student evacuees would be part of our Eastern Christian School family! (See related article in this issue.) All of us were excited to be able to give backpacks to two students who enrolled in Eastern Christian as a result of displacement by the hurricane. These students have since been able to return to Mississippi, and we realize what a blessing their presence in our school has meant to us. Their farewell parties gave evidence of the loving Christian friendships that developed even in such a short time.

In addition to this project, ECMS students participated in other worthwhile service projects:

Cash was collected for the Red Cross' hurricane relief efforts. Plastic bags were filled with personal hygiene products, which were being collected by Faith Community CRC for a homeless shelter in Florida run by former music teacher, Louise Butler's daughter.

Lemonade and iced tea were sold on street corners in Midland Park and Wyckoff on the weekend of Sept. 3, 4 and 5 by 8th graders **Danielle De Block, Megan Hutton, Alyssa Kuiken, Chelsea Noyes** and **Sara Schipper.** The girls raised a total of \$186 to benefit Red Cross Katrina Relief efforts!

Students enthusiastically participated in the ECMS PTO annual Innisbrook Wrapping Paper fundraiser which raised

\$7500 in profits. Ten percent of the profits were sent to *Christian Schools International* to help the hurricane victims in the Gulf States. Grace Christian School in Pascagoula, Mississippi has been wonderfully blessed by gifts from CSI schools. Early in November the Middle School received the following letter from **Eva Dodge**, a recipient of one of the backpacks ("bookbags") we sent:

"Dear Eastern Christian,

I have received a bookbag with school supplies from your school. I cannot tell you how much this little favor you have done has helped me so much! I lost all of my school stuff, bookbag, books — all of it! It makes me so happy to know that there are people like you out there ready to help people like me. I cannot thank you enough for my bookbag and school supplies.

I am Eva Dodge, I am 19 years old and I live in Gulfport, MS. I lost everything in the storm. In the beginning of the storm, when our house started to flood, our neighbors called us and said we need to all go in our attic because the water kept rising. So our neighbors swam over, all 6 of them (including a 3-year-old) and we all got in our attic. We luckily didn't have to break out of the attic. We stayed in the attic for about seven hours or so. I would have never thought that I would have ever had to swim in my house, and do not plan on doing it again.

I was really depressed to see all of my stuff ruined. Also, to see my school gone and my sports teams cancelled. But, now people like you are helping me get through it. I cannot thank you enough.

ECES Response to Hurricane Katrina: Helping to Rebuild a School Library

Grace Christian School, a sister *Christian Schools International* (CSI) K-8 school, lost everything except their concrete foundation when Hurricane Katrina slammed into Pascagoula, Mississippi on August 29, 2005. In the aftermath of the storm ECES learned about the school's needs through weekly CSI updates. In response to those needs, our ECES Special Projects Faculty Team planned and completed a special response project.

For two weeks in October, students donated new or slightly used children's books to help re-supply Grace Christian's library. At the beginning of the two-week project in an ECES chapel, students viewed pictures of the damage done to Grace Christian School, and each student received the challenge to donate a favorite book from his/her personal library. Students responded by giving out of their abundance to those in need.

Twelve boxes weighing a total of 425 lbs and containing nearly **1200 books** were trucked to Cary, Mississippi. From there the boxes were mailed to Grace Christian School with the help of CSI, which is coordinating the entire relief effort for the school. Accompanying the books are 13 letters, each written by the class that collected and boxed books. Included in each letter is a class picture.

The students in Donna Hoogerhyde's 4th Grade class sent the following letter of encouragement:

"Dear Friends, We can't even imagine what you are going through. We feel very badly about what happened to your school. We hope these books help to build up your library, and that you will enjoy reading them as much as we did. We are happy to help you. We will continue to pray for you.

Project Acceleration

An Exciting New Academic Option | BY ECHS PRINCIPAL JAN LUCAS

Benrolled in the highest academic level courses at ECHS now have an opportunity to begin working on their bachelor's degree at the same time they are earning high school credit. Our high school has joined Seton Hall's university-based *Project Acceleration*, which enables students to earn up to 19 college credits that will go on their official college transcript.

The process for Eastern

Christian to join *Project Acceleration* required teachers to be approved for adjunct faculty status and course content judged to be consistent with Seton Hall standards. The following course syllabi and adjunct faculty positions have been approved: Advanced Composition: **Marla Stout**; American Studies 1: **Jane Okma, Jena Cooksey**; American Studies 2: **Marla Stout, Paul Beverly**; Calculus: **Mike Alsum**; and Honors Chemistry: **Phil Verrengia**.

Seton Hall academic credits are held in escrow by the university until high school diplomas are granted. After graduation, students will request transcripts be sent from Seton Hall University to the college or university they will be attending. (Over 200 schools accept *Project Acceleration* credits.) The cost of participating in this program is currently \$60 per course credit.

The benefits for students who participate in this program are:

A significant savings on college tuition: \$60 vs. \$651 /per credit at Seton Hall. Getting a jump-start on one's college education
Access to Seton Hall library facilities and on-campus events.
Access to a variety of research databases available at Seton Hall.


Director of Guidance **Christi Tuit**, who has facilitated EC's participation in *Project Acceleration*, says, "We are pleased to offer this opportunity to our students and proud of the recognition of the high quality education we provide at Eastern Christian." While our students are engaged in the academic rigor of the most challenging courses, they may now opt for college credit at the same time.

Matthew Bouwense Awarded Rensselaer Medal

"Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute has announced the winners of the Rensselaer Medal. **Matthew Bouwense** of Wayne is this year's honoree at Eastern Christian High School.

The Rensselaer Medal, the oldest prize of its kind in the United States, is awarded by more than 2000 secondary schools throughout North America, Latin America, Europe and Asia. This award is given to students who have distinguished themselves in mathematics and science. To be honored with the Rensselaer Medal, a student must be a member of the junior class and be the high school's most promising science and mathematics student.

Each medalist who is accepted and subsequently enrolls at Rensselaer receives a scholarship of \$60,000 payable in four yearly awards of \$15,000 each." - Reported in Wayne Today in Aug. 2005

ECHS FALL ATHLETICS REPORT

¬he EC Cross Country Team had an ▲ incredible season! The Girls' Team was undefeated at 12-0 and won the League title. The Boys' Team also won the League title with a record of 11-0. In the County Meet the Girls Team finished 4th, only three points behind the 3rd Place team, while the Boys took 6th Place. In the EC Invitational, the Girls finished 2nd and the Boys placed 1st. Both teams participated in the State Meet.

The Boys' Varsity Soccer Team's record was 12-5-2 as of early November, and the team tied for second place in the BPSL league competition. They were ranked in the top 10 in the area for most of the season. The team has experienced many exciting games including an overtime win in a night game at Waldwick. In the County Tournament the 5th seeded Eagles beat De Paul before losing to Lakeland in the next round. The team beat Montclair Kimberly by a score of 4-1 in the State Tournament before losing to top-seeded Morris Catholic in the 2nd round.



New Energy Conservation Program

Our community at Eastern Christian is facing a big challenge this winter—significantly higher utility costs. In response, all of our campuses are implementing a new energy conservation program in line with our great appreciation of the gift of creation and our responsibilities as God's stewards in His world.

Beginning in November, the temperature of all occupied rooms will be set at no more than 68° and the temperature of unoccupied rooms will be at 62°. We will be attentive to the comfort of students, faculty and staff, but strongly recommend wearing warmer clothing to school this winter.

We have serviced all of our heating plants and equipment, and are looking to make specific repairs to any cracked windows or drafty doors. We have asked everyone not to change any thermostats, and to be sure to turn off lights after the last class and to turn off faucets completely after use. Space heaters are being allowed only by special permission.

Throughout what we hope will be a milder winter, we will continue to focus on these conservation efforts. A fuel surcharge on new rental agreements will be imposed, and we are asking our current renters to consider a gift to offset the increase in heating costs.

Please keep Eastern Christian School in your prayers as we move through this challenging season. Facility Improvement Updates

Two Phases of Boiler Replacement are Completed

This summer the boiler replacement project at the High School continued. In the spring we shared the exciting news about the first phase of the heating system replacement that included the lower level of the building, the cafeteria, the media center, and the classrooms in the Guidance Office corridor.

Thanks to the continued generosity of a donor, this summer saw the second phase completed. With a design completed by Reiner & Company, we were able to maximize the donor's gift and replace the heating in all classrooms located in the science and faculty room corridors. Each classroom has new radiation with individual control. Heat is provided by new boilers that operate at 94% efficiency.

The completion of this phase of the boiler replacement project reduces the load on the original boilers to the gymnasium, five classrooms in the gym corridor, and the office area. Once again, God has provided for ECSA through the generosity of a donor in our community. And as usual, God's timing is amazing. With the increased prices in fuel, our new, high-efficiency boilers should help us better control our costs in the years ahead.

New Handicap Accessible Bathrooms Installed

While the summer is a time for rest and relaxation for many, it is anything but that for the maintenance and custodial crews at Eastern Christian. The day the students and teachers begin their vacations, the maintenance crews go into *high gear!* Desks are moved out and classrooms are cleaned. Furniture is cleaned and repaired as required. Lockers are cleaned and even the gum (yes, from time to time students do chew gum) is scraped off the bottom of chairs. Finally, the floors are waxed and polished to get each building ready for the first day of the next school year.

That would be enough for anyone to handle, but every year it seems that something unusual is added to make the process a bit more difficult for our staff. This year, at the high school, we renovated two bathrooms near the gymnasium, creating dust and disruption right through the first week of school.

Thanks primarily to a grant from the **Homebound Pilots Foundation**, which was established by the late **Peter DeKorte**, these rooms were expanded and renovated to provide ADA-compliant handicap access. The initial intent was simply to renovate the existing bathrooms; but, thanks to the generosity of many, we were able to expand the rooms, relocate a janitor's closet, and install two new water coolers in the gymnasium.

Besides the two bathrooms renovated this summer, the Foundation's grant also provides funds for ADA renovations to the staff bathrooms. We hope to complete those renovations in the near future.

Special Tax Deduction Rules: Effective to End of Year

Special tax rules apply to contributions to public charities like Eastern Christian School from August 28th until December 31st. The 50% adjusted gross income limit is lifted for all cash contributions made to charities until year-end. You may wish to discuss this with your tax advisor.

Congress wants to encourage contributions going toward disaster relief, and included all other charities in this special rule adopted in September.

A taxpayer can make any gifts to charities he or she may like, but the amount that can be deducted for federal tax purposes is ordinarily limited to one-half of the taxpayer's adjusted gross income (the number at the bottom of the first page of a 1040 tax return.) The new rule allows the taxpayer to deduct up to the full amount of her or his adjusted gross income.

For example, if a taxpayer had an adjusted gross income of \$25,000, the previous limit on charitable deductions was \$12,500. Now, however, if the taxpayer had circumstances where he or she wished to contribute more than that, any contribution made until December 31st, up to \$25,000 would be deductible.

For corporations, the 10% deduction limit on charitable contributions is also temporarily lifted. This special rule only applies to cash contributions and not contributions of appreciated securities. Other special rules apply to victims of recent natural disasters and to those who have come to their aid.

T.R.I.P. Update

A new school year of T.R.I.P. (Tuition Reduction Incentive Plan) is well underway. Last year current EC parents earned almost \$90,000 in tuition credits! These credits were applied to the November and May tuition bills. In addition, "future families" (families who do not yet have their children in EC) have accumulated over \$70,000 in tuition credits, which will be available to tuition payments in future years.

T.R.I.P. is like most other things—the greater your consistency and effort, the greater the result. Please consider using T.R.I.P. with diligence this year to offset the cost of Christian education—for your own family or to help someone else. "Feed My Lambs"

A Challenging Reminder From a Former EC Teacher

"Feed my lambs!' Just how a Christian teacher fulfills that scriptural mandate is difficult to answer. So much, to my mind, depends on the teacher herself. In the degree that she feels called by the Lord for this task and no other, to the degree that she is sincerely dedicated to the teaching of His little ones, to the degree she will teach gladly, lovingly and self sacrificially. The more she teaches, and the longer she teaches, the greater she realizes the immensity of her task and her commitment to the Master. Therefore, the Christian teacher must often herself sitting at the Master's feet and absorb His teachings. It is through this that she gathers strength and serenity for her classroom teaching.

This strength, this serenity will permeate her teaching. A spirit of love will prevail in the classroom. An earnest desire will be shown to cultivate the talent of each child, whether it be the ten, the five or the one. There will be the daily desire on the part of the teacher to bring the child face to face with himself and with his need to become the Christian citizen God would have him be.

How does she accomplish this? There is no easy formula. Prayer is a vital part of each day. The child is led to feel this. Whether it be the prayer at the beginning of the day in which God's guidance is sought, or the prayer which mentions the sick child by name, or the prayer which asks God to help an individual child overcome some weakness, or seeking God's aid, to help us overcome a sin which we as a class are falling into, whatever it may be we are making the child aware that communion with God is something a Christian does all his life. After our noon meal we in our grade are leaning a new prayer every other week; these are brought in by children and teacher. To begin our afternoon work, each child gets the opportunity to open with prayer. At this time, the missionary listed in the Prayer Guide is prayed for; we also point out the field where this missionary is stationed. So the teacher sets a Christian tone in her room through prayer.

She also sets a Christian tone through her bulletin boards. Without preaching, she suggests through pictures and words an attitude for Christian boys and girls to cultivate.

In her subject matter, the Christian teacher desires to make it distinctively Christian whenever she can. A unit on Good Citizens in English is approached rather as Good Christian Citizens. Classification of all things as vertebrates and invertebrates, and the further classification of each is pointed out as a law of orderliness shown in God's creation. Research on birds, mammals, etc. find the child under the Christian teacher's guidance, realizing for himself the immensity

of God's creation. In a unit on colonization in America, the child is made to see God's guiding hand in the religious beginning of our country. Studying what the tithe means from our Bible story and showing the relationship of this to his allowance is only another instance of distinctive Christian teaching.

Then, one should not overlook the teacher's personality in shaping young Christian lives. The example of a helping hand here, and encouraging smile, a gentle reproof and even the stern warning or punishment, if carried out in love, shows that the teacher cares. By her example, she sets

the tone for Christian living and loving, and sharing and caring in her classroom.

'Feed my lambs!' A difficult mandate? Yes, to be sure! A dangerous mandate? – If entered in lightly! A demanding mandate? There is no greater! A discouraging mandate? At times! A distinctive mandate? A challenging one! For the Christian teacher it is the mandate that she knows she must fulfill, for to her it is the pearl of great price!"


