

Kenyan Night Skies

During the five years I lived in Kenya, no scenery amazed me more than the beauty and vastness of African skies. Even though the dramatic dominating daytime dome of sky daily impressed me, it was the 3-D black night sky with uncountable flickering pinpoints of light that always filled me with awe. I think of Kenyan night skies whenever I read Paul's words in Philippians 2: 15 & 16: "... in which you shine like stars in the universe as you hold out the word of life."

Of course, during the day, star shine is overwhelmed by sunshine; however, the stark contrast of deep darkness of night and flickering starlight over Kenya produced an indescribable soul response. In northern New Jersey, we rarely notice the sky and the stars. Perhaps, we live narrowly focused and myopic lives. Here, at night so many artificial lights diffuse the natural beauty of the stars. In Africa there is time to watch the sky, and man-made electrical lights have yet to dilute the darkness. Some days I find myself inadvertently yearning for the undiluted views of God-designed awesome beauty in the African skies.

A Primary Goal of Reformed Christian Education

Because at Eastern Christian children live in the daylight of <u>Son</u>shine, one may not notice that as children of God they are learning to shine brighter. But every year we graduate young people ready to "hold out the word of life" in the deep darkness of our world. A primary goal of Reformed Christian Education is for each covenant child to grow into the role of walking in the light. (*I John 1:7*) This calls for excellence in intellectual and spiritual formation so that each student is prepared and nurtured to "shine like stars" to his/her maximum potential in Christ.

A Universal Question

"Twinkle, twinkle, little star/how I wonder what you are." In the simplicity of this familiar nursery rhyme a universal question points to the wonder that flickering night stars evoke. Did you know that light traveling from the nearest stars we see lags behind by 4.3 years? When we "wonder what you are" as we look at a star, we are actually wondering what it has been because we are looking into the past. According to scientists, stars appear to twinkle because moving air in our atmosphere absorbs some of their light, which causes them to flicker.

The Word of God is the Source of Light and Life

As Christians, we believe that the source of light and life is the Word of God. We know that in partnership with parents and church, Christian Education magnifies "your light before men, that they may see ...good deeds and praise [the] Father in heaven." (Matthew

5:16) The light we see in our Eastern Christian students has originated in intentional biblical education and, like starlight, is a time-lapsed reflection of absorbed truth displayed in action. As this light interacts with the atmosphere of a dark world, it flickers, drawing attention to God's message of deliverance and eternal life.

Your investment in Christian Education and your partnership with us by God's grace is continuing to form a constellation destined to shine in an increasingly dark world that desperately needs Sonlight. "Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made. In Him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it." (John 1: 3-4)

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

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Saved to Serve

Servanthood is not a popular subject in our culture, but it is mentioned frequently in the Bible. It isn't hard to find many scriptures that point to servanthood as a lifestyle God wants us to adopt. Six reasons why service is necessary for the Christian are:

- *To build up the body of Christ* (Ephesians 4:11-12)
- To live out our beliefs and reflect the love of Jesus as we relate to others (Luke 12:35)
- *To gain a great assurance in our faith* (I Timothy 3:13)
- *To glorify God by using the gifts he has given us* (I Peter 4: 10-11)
- To follow Christ's example He was the greatest servant of all (Luke 22: 25-28)
- *To show gratitude to the Lord* (Colossians. 3:23)

The kind of life Christ wants us to live is one of service that flows from the lives of believers who are filled with God's Spirit. Servants observe a need and assume the responsibility to meet that need as the Holy Spirit directs them in their daily activities. As I reflected on servanthood, I realized that my willingness to help one of my colleagues with his chapel service preparation recently was one example of being directed by the Holy Spirit. As a result, I received a blessing because I took the time to help him. Being available to serve others is something Christians do.

If we are true disciples of Christ, we immerse ourselves in the Holy Word. This brings us face to face with our Lord, and when we read His Word we become more and more like Him. I was listening to R.C. Sproul on a videotape recently, and he spoke of a passage in the Bible that gives us three easy steps for Christian living. Micah 6:8 says, "What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." Humility and service are one and the same. Just as Jesus was willing to wash the feet of the disciples, we must

be willing to do the most mundane tasks to show our willingness to be like our God.

Rick Warren has written a book entitled *The Purpose Driven Life:* What On Earth Am I Here For? In the book, he talks about five purposes of the Christian life. Not surprisingly, one of those is service. He talks about how service starts in our mind and that all of us need an attitude change. We are all sinful people who tend to think more about ourselves than others. It is through Christ's power and in His strength that we can change our natural tendency to be self-serving. This is a lifelong challenge. Each day we need God's grace to set aside our own agenda and follow His.

Asking students to participate in service projects is a means to an end. We are hoping that, by feeling the joy and satisfaction which service brings, our students will desire more and more to live a life devoted to following Jesus, the Greatest Servant of All.

ECMS Ground-Breaking Ceremony Celebrates Milestone


Echristian Middle School students, faculty and staff joined with members of the Christian school community for a very special chapel service and Ground-Breaking Ceremony at the Wyckoff campus on Wednesday, March 19. The service celebrated God's continuing goodness to Eastern Christian and marked an important milestone as construction is set to begin on another major addition to the Middle School.

The addition will include a long-awaited gymnasium, new kitchen, and the conversion of the existing all-purpose room into new art and music rooms. Construction work is scheduled to start on March 24 and we anticipate completion by early-September, thereby allowing for the full use of the new facilities for the 2003-04 school year. This addition is the second phase of the expansion project begun over ten years ago to convert the Wyckoff campus into a modern middle school facility. The first phase of the project included a media center, computer education facilities, enlarged classroom space and locker rooms.

FUNDING FOR THE PROJECT HAS BEEN PROVIDED THROUGH:

- the generous contributions from Eastern Christian community members,
- monies raised by the Middle School PTO, and
- a significant pledge by Faith Community CRC, as the continuation of its expansive joint-use agreement with Eastern Christian.

We are planning to raise additional funding to complete the project through the anticipated completion of two real estate transactions involving the sale of the Irving Park property and the purchase of property adjacent to Eastern Christian Elementary School. The completion of these transactions should result in an estimated \$500,000 to be put toward the construction project. The remainder of the funding required to complete the project will be raised through a Capital Campaign that will also be used to fund important repairs and renovations at the EC Elementary School in Midland Park and the EC High School in North Haledon.





For the Christmas Festival our high school students are paired up with the visitors who spend several hours together participating in activities including cookie decorating, face painting, making a Christmas craft and playing games. A highlight of the ECHS Christmas Festival comes when the High School students present their "buddies" with a Christmas gift purchased especially for each of them. Smiles and laughter fill the classrooms and hallways until it's time to say "Good-bye." Then there are lots of hugs and good wishes for their new friends as well as a promise to see them again next year! Pictured are Susana Lopez and Melanie Susen with their special guest.

ECHS Senior Shares Christian Viewpoint in Local News



Senior **Rebecca Bruins** was chosen as "North Jersey Scholar of the Week" for 12/29/02 edition of The Record newspaper. She shared the following perspective with readers:

"'I' ve excelled in a lot of areas but success isn't as important as things like integrity, morals and character,' said Rebecca Bruins.

'Why? Because success may be something you're not always going to have. Things like values and integrity, they can never be taken away from you. My parents taught me that,' continued Rebecca, sounding much older and wiser than her 17 years.

Rebecca, a senior at ECHS is such an accomplished violinist that she plays with the Ridgewood Symphony Orchestra, whose members are mostly seasoned adult musicians. She is also a featured violinist and concert mistress for the Northern New Jersey Youth Orchestra and the All State Orchestra. She is on the school's varsity soccer team, a member of the National Honor Society and class council. Outside of the classroom, she is a Sunday school aide for a 5-year-old boy with Down syndrome. 'That's a very rewarding experience,' she said. 'I love helping him; I love seeing him able to learn things.'

She credits her Christian education and upbringing for stirring her compassion. 'I' ve been blessed to have had a Christian education and to go a school where people have the same faith as I do. It's important for me to go to a place where people share the same faith. It's almost like being on the same plane. It's a good opportunity for us to grow in our faith before we go out into the world.'

Although she's not sure what track she'll pursue once she does go out into the world, Rebecca knows she wants 'to glorify God and to help others.' She is thinking of majoring in music or combining that with something else 'and use that in some way to accomplish my goals. All I know is I want to use the talents God gave me.' "

A Testimony from an EC Alumnus

Bill Vanderkooi, a retired scientist and manufacturing consultant, sent in the following letter. He currently resides in Midland, Michigan with his wife Lorna:

"The excellent Herald article about an open house for Sidney Bangma's 90th birthday brought back many fond memories. **Mr. Bangma was my favorite teacher** during 1943-47 when I attended Eastern Academy. He played a large part in establishing the course of my life and careers. After a sixth grade teacher at North 4th Street Christian School sparked my early

interest in science, Mr. Bangma nurtured that interest with his math and science courses. His teaching made it fun to learn. He also made us welcome to eat with him in his classroom in the old annex building of EA overlooking 7th Street. By time I graduated and headed for Calvin College I felt the Lord was leading me to be a Christian school math and science teacher, just like my role model, Mr. Bangma. Other teachers who also provided particularly long term benefits for me were Mr. VanTil teaching writing and English grammar, someone teaching one semester of typing that my Dad advised me to take, those who taught Reformed Doctrine, and all the teachers who gave me a great love for Christian Education.

Teachers plant many seeds as they educate young people, and probably wonder if it was worth the effort and what happened to the young lives they helped mold. If it might be of any interest or encouragement, I will share briefly what God did in the life of this alumnus. From EA I went to Calvin College and majored in Christian Education, Mathematics, and Science to prepare for a teaching career. However, our Lord then used chemistry professor, John De Vries, to guide me to change direction and go on to graduate school instead of into the classroom. At Purdue University John's brother, Tom De Vries, was my major professor; and I earned MS and PhD degrees in chemistry. I had experience in both teaching and research assistant positions at Calvin and Purdue, and enjoyed research more than teaching. After much prayer, it became clear to me that the Lord was leading me to a professional research career rather than teaching. Why then had He led me to take all those education courses? The Lord's ways sometimes become apparent in hindsight.

Accepting a job offer from The Dow Chemical Company, my wife Lorna (a Christian school teacher) and I moved to Midland, Michigan, where I enjoyed a forty year career of doing product and process improvement research for Dow production plants in both this country and Europe. I retired from Dow in 1995 at age 66. My other career I trust has greater eternal significance. Soon after we moved to Midland we joined with a few other families desiring to have a Christian school here. We started the Midland Christian School in 1960, and I have served in many capacities on the Board most years since then. Attending Christian elementary, high school, and college; and taking all the education courses, was God's way of preparing me for a lifetime of service in Christian Education, even though it was not in the classroom. After retiring from Dow, besides continuing to serve as Treasurer of the Midland Christian School Association, I took on a continuing volunteer responsibility of installing and maintaining a networked computer system in the

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school. This soon expanded to include doing the same for our church and another Christian organization. I expect to continue serving the Lord in whatever capacity He calls me to do for as long as He gives me the ability to do so.

The Lord has richly blessed me with the privilege of serving Him in unique ways, and used my many Christian teachers to prepare me for the tasks He would call me to perform. My sincere thanks goes to all the Christian teachers who helped prepare me for an enjoyable life of serving our Lord in the area of Christian education."

Ron Van Der Weert (Cl. of '68) wrote the following article for his local weekly newspaper. Ron was a USAF fighter pilot and retired with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in 1994. He graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1997. Ron and his wife Linda reside in Rocksprings, Texas where Ron is the pastor of the First Baptist Church. Ron adds, "I am doing well on my recovery and am back to ministering full time. My best friend, Jesus Christ, is watching over me and helping me every day."

Who Is Your Neighbor?

In the Bible, Jesus tells the parable of the Good Samaritan. It is the story of a man who was on a journey through the hills. He was attacked by robbers and left half dead on the side of he road. Some who passed by and saw the man could have helped, but they didn't. Finally, one individual came by and helped the man. Jesus was teaching with the story that it was truly the individual who helped that was the injured man's neighbor.

Over the last eight weeks since my motorcycle accident I have had the opportunity to learn who are really my neighbors. While one thinks of a neighbor as the person living next door, I have found that the true definition of neighbor goes well beyond the immediate locale of one's house. My neighbors are located in the town of Rocksprings, throughout Edwards County, all over the state of Texas, and around the world. It is people in all of these areas that have shown themselves to be my neighbor.

Immediately after the accident, as I lay on the side of the mountain, I found by my side: Joe Baker, Glynn Hendley, and John Davis. They were there to give me immediate first aid, call for EMS, and give words of encouragement. Soon others passing by stopped to help and the EMS folks arrived from Junction. Everyone was working together to get me to needed medical care. The only negative comment spoken was how big and heavy I was for hauling up the side of the mountain! Of course, that was just a true statement of fact, and I told them they were lucky I had been on a diet that week and had lost a couple of pounds. And since then, I have lost a few more.

Diagnosed with five broken ribs, I spent the night at the Junction hospital. Even while there, the word had spread of my accident and I had bikers from the Christian Motorcycle Association stopping in to check on my progress and to pray for me. Discharged the next day, I returned home, only to find my condition getting worse. By midnight, I was having trouble breathing and my temperature was dropping. Linda called on a neighbor to come over and help, while at the same time calling for our EMS. Despite the late hour and rain, our EMS arrived to lend much needed aid. Three more neighbors made up the crew. Under their expert care I arrived at Val Verde hospital and was able to receive life saving care. Apparently the broken ribs had caused other damage resulting in internal bleeding and lung damage. Part of the lifesaving procedures was receiving two units of blood from two more neighbors I had never met, but they had cared enough to have donated blood for someone in need.

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The eight days I spent in Val Verde hospital, followed by another 24 days in Wilford Hall Medical Center, San Antonio, also allowed me to meet many of my neighbors: some visited me in person, some spoke to me by telephone, some sent cards, and many lifted me up in prayer — every one of them a neighbor who cared. My favorite, as well as the favorite of the hospital staff, was the eight-foot banner wishing me well that the children at Little Miracles Childcare Center made for me. They are my little neighbors learning at an early age how to be big neighbors when they grow up. I had the banner prominently displayed on the wall at the foot of my bed so that I could constantly see it and show it to visitors.

Finally, after three operations, the final one of which was open chest surgery to repair the right lung area, I was able to return home. Once again, I got to see my neighbors in action. Meals were supplied by members of the church family. Doc Todd stopped by to make sure I was doing OK. Pastors of the local churches visited or passed along words of encouragement; and told me that their congregations had been praying for me. Over the weeks I was recovering various needs of the church were taken care of by members of the church, deacons preached, and other visiting clergy helped to fill the pulpit.

During this whole ordeal, my wife, Linda, who is an RN, was by my side to care for me. Now I know why God had me marry a nurse. I could not have made it without her. She is my best and closest "neighbor." Of course, with her by my side the school had to make due without her presence. Here again, our good neighbors of the school staff told her to take care of me and not worry about school. They saw to it that her position was covered and that the children received proper medical care.

As you can see, I have hundreds of neighbors who reached out to me after I was found by the side of the road. I want to thank each and every one of you who had a part in my recovery. I could never list all by name. The numbers are too great. While it will be months for complete healing to take place, I will be back in the pulpit to deliver God's word starting again this Sunday. And, if you have not guessed it, I'll start preaching a series on the story of the Good Samaritan, but from the perspective of the injured man who lay by the wayside. You see, I've been there and I know what it is like. Who is your neighbor? Everyone who reaches out to someone in need says, "I am you neighbor, and I care." That's the way it should be.

Strategic Planning Team Update

The Strategic Planning Team has been actively involved evaluating data from surveys distributed to students and parents last spring. As a result, the team is focusing on two specific 5-year objectives for improvement at the High School:

Technology Objectives:

- Gaining proficiency in word processing, spreadsheet, presentation and database software
- Developing ethical knowledge and practice in technology use
- Using advanced technology software applications, i.e. CAD, graphics, web design, accounting and programming software
- Encouraging female student success on a parity with males
- Becoming knowledgeable about operating systems and research tools

Communications Objectives:

- Linking broad ideas and concepts to specific details in reading and writing
- Developing effective oral communication skills
- Developing and improving proficiency in writing
- Developing and improving listening skills

To qualify as Middle States Commission-approved objectives, the plan must directly impact student learning, and its effectiveness must be determined with data. A significant challenge for each of the Action Teams writing the objectives is to select appropriate assessments to measure progress.

Now that our objectives have been approved by Middle States, we will begin formulating implementation plans. During the last week in April, the Middle States Commission will send a 5-person team of evaluators for an on-site visit to our school. Our accreditation for the next 5-year period is contingent upon an objective assessment of the entire high school program according to Middle States' standards and a viable plan for improvement, which is being implemented.



ECHS Creative Writing students hosted an "Evening of Readings." Their parents, uncles and friends enjoyed the semi-formal atmosphere created by the twelve students on the evening of January 16 in the High School Media Center. Their audience was in for a treat as young people entertained

them with readings of poetry, essays and short stories. These students presented the best of their work from the semester-long Creative Writing course taught by

Mrs. Agnes Fisher. These students are also in the process of publishing their own small books. Middle School counselor **Ginny Hoogstra** read Dave's Thanksgiving testimony in which Dave talked about the importance of friends and family in getting him through the rough times. Most importantly, though, Dave wrote:

"I would like to thank God. In Philippians 4:13 it says, 'I can do everything through Him who gives me strength.' God has been with me every day and has shown me such love and grace.

Through my whole ordeal, I have seen God work in my life, causing my relationship with Him to be stronger."

Students and staff were asked to bring in pennies (other coins, bills and checks were also accepted!). The money was counted each day and recorded on large "thermometers" located on a billboard in the Media Center hallway. The billboard also contained inspirational sayings regarding giving, service and kindness, as well as a dozen terms relating to leukemia and their definitions. These same inspirational sayings have also been placed in every homeroom. They served as a reminder to students and staff alike that "Pennies for Patients" provides each and every one of us the opportunity to "shine like stars in the universe."

In honor of David, the Middle School raised over \$4,626.18 for this worthy cause. In conjunction with this fundraiser, the ECMS staff donated food items to the Emmanuel Cancer Foundation in Midland Park, NJ. ECF works with families of children diagnosed with cancer by providing counseling, food, clothing and monetary assistance as needed by the families they serve. According to Mrs. Hoogstra, "Dave's faith is an inspiration to all of us at the Middle School."

These cards were about three feet wide and four feet long to fit all the students who wanted to send uplifting messages to 'Mr. H.' Through this project, we believe Mr. Holwerda was blessed, but the students were uplifted also. They 'shone like stars in the universe' because they 'held out the Word of Life.' As Jesus reminds us in Matthew, what we did for 'Mr. H.' we did for Christ, which is a labor never done in vain."

Everett Henderson shared: "We visited the Longview Assisted Living Center at the Christian Health Care Center. The students got to interact with the elderly residents and were reminded to 'show respect for the elderly and revere your God." (Lev. 19:52)

Joann Everett's homeroom decided to work together to fill five shoeboxes of "school tools" for underprivileged children in the USA. During the months of September and October, students donated a variety of new school supplies. Items such as notebook paper, crayons, scissors as well as small toys were neatly packed into brightly wrapped shoeboxes. These boxes were then shipped to the Oklahoma City office of Kid's Stuff USA, an organization affiliated with Feed The Children. The students were thrilled to know that their homeroom service project would bring joy to boys or girls who might not otherwise have the necessary "tools" to do their best work in school.

Each year sixth graders study the countries of Africa, and this project enables them to not only learn about this country, but also to touch the lives of some students there.

Denise Post's homeroom planted daffodil bulbs in the grassy circle around the flag pole. They will bloom in place of the large pine tree that fell on Sept. 11. This spring they hope to see hundreds of beautiful daffodils filling the void where the pine tree once stood.

Weekly our homeroom e-mails the unit. In October, two boxes filled with candy, snacks and magazines were sent. For Christmas, we mailed each of the soldiers boxes filled with his/her favorite candy, DVDs, magazines, a Bible and "goodies." Also shipped were lots of items for young children. Frequently, the soldiers go on humanitarian missions visiting small villages, bringing medical supplies and offering "goodies" to the children. Mrs. Tyvoll said, "Occasionally we hear back from 'our guys.' We continue to pray for their physical safety, salvation and spiritual growth while they serve our country."



Relying on God

In the last issue we talked about understanding that God owns everything and we are managers of the gifts He gives. This is a foundational principal in understanding our relationship to God and how we should respond to Him. If we don't get this one right, the rest won't make any sense!

Principle #2: GIVING IS ESSENTIAL

Giving is the result of understanding what it means to live a life of stewardship. It is essential because it involves putting God first in our lives.

In what ways can we put God first? One way is to spend time with God - to have a daily quiet time with Him. If that is not happening in our lives, it means that someone or something else is more important than the Lord.

Another way to put God first is to trust Him to take care of us. Trusting comes before giving. Sometimes it is easier to trust God for our eternal salvation than it is to trust Him to "give us this day our daily bread." However, Christians know that if we trust in God and live according to His will, He will take care of all our needs. If we trust in God, we can never say "I can't afford to give." According to Deut. 14:23, one purpose of tithing was to teach the people of Israel to put God first in their lives. Tithing teaches a reliance on God that is fundamental to our relationship with Him.

Alumni News – Exploring EC's Roots

Stepping Back in Time: 1947

The roots of Eastern Christian School and how it has grown and developed is a familiar topic for many alumni, but this history is increasingly unknown to many of our current families and recent graduates. Therefore, we share this 1947 reprint from a National Union of Christian Schools' publication, *Welcome to the East*. Part I of this recurring column focuses on North 4th Street Christian School (Paterson), one of the schools that was eventually consolidated into the Eastern Christian School Association.

North 4th Street Christian School

"When the friends and promoters of Christian Instruction met on August 7, 1892, they did not realize what important step they had taken. The ideal of the first President, Rev. P. Van Vlaanderen, has been realized today. He favored a chain of Christian Schools in Paterson and vicinity and a Christian High School centrally located, and Amity St. Chr. School, now North Fourth Str. School, as the first Christian school in this section.



About 65 persons were assembled in 1892 to organize a Christian school society. Several meetings were held during the first year and these meetings were well attended. The school was opened by Principal R. Haan, now retired, Dr. R. L. Haan, and his assistant, Mr. Van Vliet. During the first years of its existence, the school had to face not only the attacks and sneers of some of our own people, but to finance the school properly was a difficult task. Our pioneer educators, with diplomas received in the Netherlands did excellent work, and some of our sincere young men and women were willing to teach in a Christian school to guide the covenant youth. They were willing to sacrifice!

When Mr. B. Stegink graded the school and improved conditions, critics were silenced in naming our school a 'Dutch' school. A branch was started in 1899 in the Riverside section, which subsequently became the Riverside School sponsored by a separate society. Still later on Paterson Christian High school, now Eastern Academy, had its beginning in our school, in 1919. Our present building was erected in 1908 and improvements have been made from time to time.

Our enrollment (August 1947) is about four hundred pupils. We have more supporters and more families who send their children but less pupils than twenty years ago. This is due to smaller families and people moving out to the suburbs.

Financial income is derived from tuition, donations, Labor Day Picnic income, proceeds from the Mutual Burial Fund, the annual campaign and the six supply funds from our Christian Reformed churches: Paterson I, Paterson II, Paterson III, Prospect Park, Bethel and Preakness. Our budget for next year is \$35,600. Will the Christian school persist? We answer 'Yes, if we are faithful to our trust.'"

Memories of a North 4th Street Graduate

Alida (Woudenberg) Graham, a resident of the Holland Christian Home in North Haledon, remembers much from grades 5 - 8 at the North 4th Street Christian School. That is quite remarkable since she graduated from the school as an 8th grader in February of 1919. "I remember our principal, Mr. Bos and Garret Dykstra, my 8th grade teacher," she says.

Alida finished 8th grade with "Second Honors" but the principal asked her if she wouldn't mind the award going to a boy – "who would find it more useful on his resume" – and she graciously agreed. She also recalls one student who had failed but was allowed to graduate with the class' permission. She added, "He went on to become very successful." Alida is a former member of the First Christian Reformed Church. She attended Spencer Business School and became an accountant, even though she admits math was not her best subject. She remains active and is a regular in the woodworking shop at the Holland Home.



Class of '52 Reunion Booklet Excerpts

The Class of '52 Reunion Booklet included this forward: "It is difficult to believe that 50 years have passed since we graduated from EA. We as a class came to the realization very quickly that graduation was but a stepping-stone toward our future goals and ambitions. Many of us went on to further education in preparation for our life's work. Whatever our profession, we lived out the Christian philosophy that shaped our high school education, striving to do all 'to the honor and glory of our God.' The word that seems to characterize us as a class at this time in our lives as we wind down our professional careers is our gift for volunteering. Many of us contribute countless hours in the service of our families, churches, service organizations and communities."

On the humorous side, Frank De Haan submitted the following memory in the reunion booklet: "It was a very cold winter morning. For some reason, Rev. Beversluis, our homeroom sponsor, was out of the room. Big mistake. As we watched, Ren Broekhuizen opened a window (Brr!), leaned out, and with our room's window opening pole, pushed down and opened an upper window of the homeroom below us. Seeing the happy look on his face, I took off down the stairs and watched the fun through the window in the door to Milo Okkema's homeroom. As Mr. Okkema took his pole and pushed the window up and closed it, the mysterious "pole from the sky" reappeared and opened a different window, which, of course, Mr. Okkema raced over and closed. As you would guess, his homeroom students found this to be hilarious, especially when it soon became apparent that Mr. Okkema was going to lose big time, i.e., the mystery pole was operated by someone with far more athleticism than he. After a few more window jousts, Mr. Okkema came to his senses and headed up to our homeroom, thus putting an end to a most stimulating homeroom session."

Some other memories shared by classmates included: "Sidney Van Til's endless outlines," "The winning girl's basketball and softball teams and coach Helen Kamp Van Hassel," "The Solid Triggers' and Mr. B.," "Listening to ballgames in study hall," "Stand-up chapel," "The Academy Spa'—the official hangout for the boys, and 'Kings' for the girls," "Barney Steen's grueling cross country runs," "Memorable teachers...Rev. Nick Beversluis, Sidney Bangma, Sidney Van Til, Cornelius Bontekoe, Milo Okkema, Wilbur De Vries"

ECSA Endowment Fund - Holding Steady in a Changing Market

These have been discouraging times for Endowment Funds that colleges depend on to supplement their operating income. Even more so is the decline in value of the funds that the various states use to fund their retirement plans. Recent newspaper articles have highlighted these difficulties. According to The New York Times on 1/21/03:

"College endowments last year turned in their worst performance since 1974, according to a survey of 600 institutions by the National Association of College and University Business Officers. The average college endowment shrank 6% in the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2002 and 3.6% in 2001, the first back-to-back declines since the group began its survey in 1971."

It is natural to ask then, "How has our Endowment Fund fared?" Throughout the turmoil of recent years, the Fund has held up very well!

- The payout rate of colleges' funds has dropped to as little as 5.00%, but ours has remained steady at better than 8.00%.
- The market value of colleges' funds has dropped as much as 8%; the states' has dropped as much as 6%. Our Endowment Fund has risen **8%** between September 2001 and September 2002, while its market value has remained a mere 2% below book value.
- Income earned by the Fund and paid to the School has <u>risen</u> from \$367,000 in 2001 to **\$383,000 in 2002**. The current year's contribution is expected to be about the same.

The gifts that have been given to the Endowment Fund over the years have kept on giving in spite of ups and downs in the nation's economy. A gift to the Endowment Fund of ECSA today will help us provide a superior Christian education for our current students and those in future generations.
